

LIVING WITH A BLIND DOG

IT IS OKAY TO FEEL OVERWHELMED

It can be difficult when your dog goes blind, but they rely heavily on their sense of smell and hearing so can adapt well to having no vision.

Every animal is individual in their coping mechanisms and how they adapt, but there are a number of different ways you can help them. Your dog can sense emotion, so it is important to remain positive and to treat your furry family member the same as before they lost their sight.

ENVIRONMENT

- Keep your dog to a normal routine
- Use toys that engage your dogs hearing and sense of smell
- Avoid moving furniture as much as possible, your dog will remember the orientation of your house
 - Mark areas of importance with different floor textures
 - Make your dog a 'safe haven'

REASSURANCE

- Talk to your dog as you approach, so they know you are there
- Teach your dog commands such as 'stop' to help them navigate
- Offer positive reinforcement and reassurance to help your dog regain their confidence.
- Having another dog can act as a 'guide dog'

WALKING



Walk your dog on a harness, this is more secure.



Do not let them off in new or unfamiliar places.



There are special harnesses, bandanas and collars to alert others of your pets disability.
